Local School Wellness Policy: Triennial Assessment Template (created July 2026)

Local School Wellness Policy & Triennial Assessment General Information [7 CFR 210.31\(a\)](#)

Each local educational agency (LEA) must establish a local school wellness policy for all schools participating in the National School Lunch Program and/or School Breakfast Program under the jurisdiction of the local educational agency. The local school wellness policy (SWP) is a written plan that includes methods to promote student wellness, prevent and reduce childhood obesity, and provide assurance that school meals and other food and beverages sold and otherwise made available on the school campus during the school day are consistent with applicable minimum Federal standards.

An assessment of your school wellness policy must be conducted a minimum of once every three years (triennial) per United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) regulations [7 CFR 210.31\(e\)\(2\)](#).

Purpose

The template below is a way to summarize the information gathered during your assessment. It includes the following requirements of the assessment:

- 1) Designate one or more local educational agency officials or school officials to ensure that each participating school complies with the local school wellness policy;
- 2) At least once every three years, assess schools' compliance with the local school wellness policy, and make assessment results available to the public. The assessment must measure the implementation of the local school wellness policy, and include:
 - i. The extent to which schools under the jurisdiction of the local educational agency are in compliance with the local school wellness policy;
 - ii. The extent to which the local educational agency's local school wellness policy compares to model local school wellness policies; and
 - iii. A description of the progress made in attaining the goals of the local school wellness policy.

Results

The copy of the assessment, as well as the current wellness policy, must be made available to the public. How these documents are shared publicly is the decision of the LEA. Many LEAs choose to post the results on their district website.

Recordkeeping

Keep a copy of the most recent triennial assessment on file for at least three full school years plus the current year. MT OPI will assess compliance with the wellness policy requirements as a part of the general areas of the School Nutrition Programs Administrative Review.

The district will provide resources and training to school and OST staff on appropriate ways to discipline students. The district requires that physical activity opportunities be adapted to make them accessible to students with disabilities. The district requires physical activity opportunities be offered to students from, but not limited to: • physical education • classroom physical activity • active academics • daily recess • before- and after-school activities, including sports • support for and promotion of active transportation.
